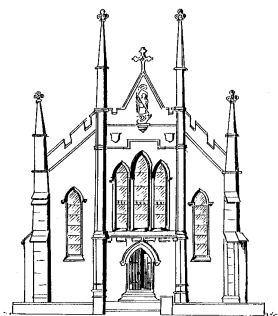

St Aelred of Rievaulx, Pray for us

In 1134, Aelred became a monk at Rievaulx Abbey, a Cistercian monastery founded two years previously. A talented author, theologian, preacher and diplomat, Aelred rose to become abbot of Rievaulx between 1147 and his death in 1167. Many of the monastery’s buildings date to this time. Aelred was a loving and inspirational father to his monks. One of them, Walter Daniel, wrote a life of his abbot. Thanks to this we know more about Aelred than any other person associated with Rievaulx in the Middle Ages.

Prayer of St Hilary of Poitiers

Saint Hilary, Pray for us

Saint Kentigern, Pray for us

St Hilary was born and died in Poitiers, he was Bishop of Poitiers and a Doctor of the Church. He was sometimes referred to as the "Hammer of the Arians" and the "Athanasius of the West". His name comes from the Latin word for happy or cheerful. He died on 1st November 367.

St Kentigern, also known as Mungo ('Dear One'), was born in Culross, Scotland.

The Christian king of Strathclyde welcomed the saint and arranged his consecration as bishop in around 540. His holy example and his preaching drew together a large community known as 'Clasgu' ('dear family'), which ultimately grew into the town and city of Glasgow. A strong anti-Christian movement forced him to go to Wales, staying for a time with Saint David at Menevia. But after founding a large monastery at Llanelwy, later called St Asaph's, he returned with some of his Welsh disciples to Galloway and Cumberland and then back to Glasgow in 581, where he was visited by Saint Columba.

Saturday – St Anthony of Egypt

Abbot

patron saint of Animals, skin diseases, farmers, butchers, the poor, basket makers, brush-makers, gravediggers, Pontifical Ecclesiastical Academy, Rome

O God, who brought the Abbot Saint Anthony to serve You by a wondrous way of life in the desert, grant, through his intercession, that, denying ourselves, we may always love You above all things. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, Your Son, who lives and reigns with You in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Today's Gospel reading: Mark 2:13-17

Today's prayer:

Heavenly Father,
St Anthony the Abbot accepted Your call to renounce the world and to love You above all things. He faithfully served You in the solitude of the desert by fasting, prayer, humility and good works. In the Sign of the Cross, he triumphed over the Devil. Through his intercession, may we learn to love You more deeply; with all our hearts, all our souls, all our minds, all our strength and to love our neighbours as we love ourselves.

St Anthony the Abbot, great and powerful saint, Pray for us.

St Anthony of Egypt (c. 251–356) is the father of Christian monasticism. Hearing the Gospel call to sell all, he withdrew to the desert, embracing prayer, fasting, and spiritual combat. His wisdom, recorded by St Athanasius, shaped monastic life and inspired generations to seek God in solitude and charity across the Church, East and West alike.
